

The sense of smell is a bridge between our experience of foods and our experience of the larger world: we perceive food aromas during eating when we breathe out, and smells from our surroundings when we breathe in. Because smells are triggered by molecules emitted from their sources, they can give us uniquely direct and detailed information about the material world and its otherwise unapparent workings. This is especially true when we take advantage of "perception at second hand," the experiences and understanding accumulated by millennia of attentive smellers, from ancient poets to Nobelist chemists.

For many people in the 21st century, eating and drinking provide the most frequent, diverse, intimate, and pleasurable contact with the stuff of our planet. The aromas of food and drink are an especially rewarding medium through which to encourage a deeper engagement with the material world, and with our own powers of perception and understanding.

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
